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THE BILINGUAL CHILD



If you live in an English-speaking country but your first language is not English, what language will you speak to your children at home? What if you and your spouse speak different languages? Which language will you use with your children? If your child hears both languages at home, will he have problems when he gets to school? Here is some information that might help to answer these questions.

hear the sounds of any language. However, if you speak to a child in just one language, after about six to nine months, he will only hear the sounds of that language. If you want a child to have two first languages, he will need to hear each of them at least 70% of the time when he is a baby. If you and your spouse speak two different languages, you may each decide to talk to your baby in your first language, or you might choose the language that the child will not hear in school. In both cases, your child will benefit.

Second, how well do bilingual children do in school? When a child grows up with two first languages, he will sometimes confuse them. If he can't think of a word in one language, he might use a word from the other language. However, this will stop as

soon as the child learns enough vocabulary. It is also true that a bilingual child might learn to read more slowly than a monolingual child. However, he will soon catch up. Then he will be able to read, write, and speak two languages for the rest of his life. And that is a wonderful gift to give any child.

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
